What Does It Cover?


- Remaining tuition & fees for up to two years at College of the Mainland
- Available for both academic and workforce training programs
- Helps students earn an associate degree or workforce certificate debt-free



How to Qualify for the Promise Scholarship

To receive the Promise Scholarship, students must:

- Live in a Participating Community:
- Texas City, La Marque, Hitchcock, or Santa Fe
- Be a 2026 High School Graduate.
- Must have earned a high school diploma from an eligible school district, charter school, private school, home school of GED.
- Apply & Enroll at COM full time for fall 2026 (Either starting fall session 1 or 2).
- Complete FAFSA (or TASFA) and maintain good academic standing.



Steps to Apply as a Promise Scholarship Student

Step 1: Apply to COM

Complete the **ApplyTexas** application for College of the Mainland

Step 2: Complete the FAFSA

(or TAFSA for eligible students)
Submit financial aid forms to determine eligibility

Step 3: Enroll Full-Time at COM

Must take at least **12 credit hours** per semester (or full-time in a workforce program)

Step 4: Maintain Academic

Progress

Stay in **good academic standing** to remain eligible for funding

The COM Dual Credit Advantage



The COM Dual Credit Advantage gives high school students two pathways to earn college credit while completing their high school diploma.

- Dual Credit Courses Take individual college classes at your high school, at COM, or online.
- Collegiate High School (CHS) Enroll in a structured program taking both high school and college courses at COM to earn an associate degree by high school graduation.

Save time, save money, and get a head start on your future!

What is Dual Credit?

Students can earn both high school and college credit by completing one course.

Earn College Credit

Earn college credit early to save time and money.

College Resources

Dual Credit students have access to the college library, tutoring services, career exploration and more.

Eased Transition

Dual Credit students are eased into the demands of college level work in a familiar, supportive environment.

Head Start

Complete foundation courses that will transfer to a public college or university in Texas or get ahead on earning a workforce certificate. Dual Credit is a special program that allows high school students to take college courses while still earning high school credit.

- Take real college courses while still in high school
- Earn both high school and college credit for the same class
- Classes may be taught at your high school, at COM, or online

How Does Dual Credit Work?

- You enroll in a collegelevel course approved by both your high school and College of the Mainland.
- The course follows college standards and earns you real college credits upon passing.

Taught by College-Approved Instructors

- Courses follow college-level standards.
- Classes may be taught by high school teachers or college professors.

Where Can You Take Dual Credit Courses?

- At Your High School Convenient & familiar.
- At College of the Mainland (COM) Campus Experience college life!
- Online Flexible learning on your own schedule.



What is Collegiate High School?

Collegiate High School (CHS) is a structured program where students take <u>all</u> classes at COM and graduate high school with both a diploma and an associate degree!

- Enjoy a college campus experience!
- Receive personalized support for high school & college success.

Graduate high school as a college sophomore!



What is Collegiate High School (Cont.)

CHS at a Glance

Location

All classes are taken at College of the Mainland.

Participation in high school and college extra-curricular activities is encouraged.

Target Students

Students who want the rigor and challenge of college courses and the freedom of a flexible schedule.

Goal

All students will work towards high school graduation and associate degree requirements simultaneously.

Course Load

Students are enrolled as full-time college students and take a minimum of 12 college hours a semester.

How Does Collegiate High School Work?

- Students enroll in college-level courses while completing high school requirements at COM
- CHS students follow a structured academic degree plan to stay on track for graduation

CHS is the fastest way to earn a college degree while still in high school—saving time and money!

Taught by College Professors

- Courses meet college-level standards
- Students have access to college resources, advising, and student life

Where and When Do CHS Students Take Classes?

- All classes are taken on the COM campus, giving students a true college experience
- Courses may be offered in person, hybrid or online for flexibility
- Most CHS students complete their associate's degree without having to participate in summer courses.

College Readiness and Support Resources for Student Success

College Courses = Higher Expectations

Dual Credit and CHS students are enrolled in real college classes and must meet college-level standards.

Here's what to expect:

- More Independence Professors treat you like a college student.
- Time Management is Key Fewer reminders, more personal responsibility
- **Stronger Study Habits** College coursework requires deeper thinking and preparation
- **Critical Thinking & Participation** Expect discussions, research and writing at a higher level
- **Grading Differences** College grades are based on fewer assignments and exams

Upward Bound (UB) is a federally funded program that helps high school students prepare for college.

- Academic Tutoring Get extra help in core subjects
- College Prep & Mentorship Support in choosing colleges and applying for scholarships
- Summer College Experience Take part in summer enrichment programs on a college campus
- Financial Aid & FAFSA Assistance Help with applying for financial aid and understanding college costs

Who Can Join?

- High school students from first-generation or low-income backgrounds
- Students motivated to attend college but need additional support

Upward Bound provides a strong foundation to help students succeed in higher education!

Eligibility, Steps to Apply & Costs

Steps to Apply for Dual Credit & Collegiate High School

How to Apply: Dual Credit and CHS

Step 1:

Complete the Interest Form

Step 2:

Take the TSIA2 or submit qualifying ACT or SAT scores

Step 3:

Complete the ApplyTexas Application.

- Select College of the Mainland as your institution
- Use your high school email for easy communication

Step 4:

Meet with Your High School Counselor

- Dual Credit will select classes.
- CHS will discuss requirements

Steps to Apply for Dual Credit & Collegiate High School (Cont.)

Step 5:

Submit the CHS application packet (CHS applicants only)

- Includes:
 - Personal Essay explaining your academic goals
 - Parent (or Guardian), Counselor & Teacher Recommendations
 - Immunization Records

Step 6:

Attend a CHS Interview (CHS applicants only)

Step 7:

Enroll in Classes

Step 8:

Pay Tuition or Confirm Scholarship Eligibility.

- Check if you qualify for the FAST Scholarship (free tuition for eligible students)
- Make payment arrangements if needed

Cost of Attendance

DUAL CREDIT TUITION

- In-District: \$33/credit hour (\$99 for a 3-credit class)
- Out-of-District:
 \$45/credit hour
 (\$135 for a 3-credit class)

COLLEGIATE HIGH SCHOOL TUITION

- \$31/credit hour (\$93 for a 3-credit class)
- \$2,700/year Administrative Fee
- Paid by select ISDs

Fast Scholarship: Free Tuition for Eligible Students

The FAST Scholarship helps make college more affordable for Dual Credit and CHS students.

What Does It Cover?

- Full tuition for Dual Credit and CHS courses
- Any additional fees (not including \$2,700 administrative fee for Collegiate High School)
- Textbooks & supplies no out-of-pocket costs!

Who Qualifies?

- Students who received Free or Reduced Lunch in the past four years
- Students enrolled in COM Dual Credit courses or CHS

No Application Needed!

 COM automatically confirms eligibility – no extra paperwork required!
